Transparency and Dialogue: German Digital Library Launches Online Portal “Collections from Colonial Contexts”

A key prerequisite for the centralised digital publication of information on collections from colonial contexts

Via its new online portal “[Collections from Colonial Contexts](#)”, the German Digital Library ([Deutsche Digitale Bibliothek](#)) offers centralised access to digitalised collections from colonial contexts in all German cultural and academic institutions. The new portal is particularly intended for people from the countries and communities of origin and provides information about the items and their history in German, English and French. The German Digital Library’s online portal has thus created a basis for the greatest possible transparency about the location of collection items from colonial contexts in German cultural and academic institutions, which in turn enables a dialogue to develop with the countries and communities of origin all over the world. The portal is free of charge and registration is not required.

At the time of launching, information about more than 100,000 items in a total of 26 institutions in Germany can be retrieved through the portal. These include cultural assets, artefacts, jewellery, tools, weapons and musical instruments as well as botanical specimens, all from territories that were once under colonial rule or on which colonial structures continued to have an influence. The portal also includes records of cultural assets that have already been restituted.

The “3-road strategy on the documentation and digital publication of collections from colonial contexts held in Germany” agreed between the German federal government, the *Länder* (federal states) and municipal umbrella organisations in October 2020 provided the basis for creating the portal. It was funded by the Federal Government Commissioner for Culture and the Media.

The research resources offered by the portal will be continually expanded, with a steady increase in the number of items in the database. In the longer term the portal is intended to make comprehensive records of holdings from colonial contexts in German cultural and academic institutions accessible to an international public.

Functions

Filters and advanced searches

When searching for items in the online portal, users can filter for “society of origin”, “object type” and “places”. The records contain structured information about the production and use of the items as well as changes in ownership. An advanced search can be used to look specifically for events in the history of an item, such as its production and provenance as well as its materials or techniques.

Provenance

The circumstances under which cultural assets from colonial contexts originated and how they ended up in collections is often complex: they may have been exchanged, gifted, purchased, stolen or looted. The new online portal charts the history of changes in possession and ownership, enabling users to trace the provenance more easily. The records give the original names of the items as well as the language of origin; where they are not known, this is indicated.

Sensitive objects

The portal also includes information about items that are treated restrictively in the communities of origin – for example, items that not everyone is allowed to see. For sensitive items of this kind the portal offers information in text form only. This applies particularly to items with a ceremonial or ritual function.

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Contact to cultural institutions

Users can send their comments, corrections and questions directly to the cultural institution in question via a contact form – this is designed to facilitate dialogue between representatives of communities of origin and researchers.

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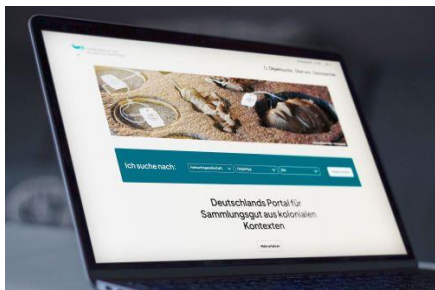

This flint axe from Togo was acquired by the Five Continents Museum Munich in 1915 as part of a large set of similar objects comprising 269 pieces. It originates from the collection of the former governor of the German colony Togoland, Julius Count von Zech auf Neuhofen (1868–1914), and was given to the Museum by his sister-in-law, Countess von Zech.
